Message from Peggy Guckin State Regent

Dear Members.

It has been a busy summer. The State Board met May 30 – June 1. On Sunday, June 1, we had our first official duty as state officers by attending the 60th Anniversary of Court Rose Cecilia #1641, my home court. It was a pleasure to introduce my fellow state officers to my members and the members across the city.

In July, all the state officers attended the State Officers Conference at Our Lady of the Snows Shrine in Belleville, Illinois. Every morning and evening, we prayed together, whether it was Mass or Benediction. On Friday morning, we had early Mass and breakfast and then we boarded buses for a pilgrimage and toured three churches. On returning back to the bus after visiting each church, we had a prayer service. On Saturday morning, we celebrated the Sacrament of the Sick. It was beautiful as the priest went around to all the members and anointed us.

We were saddened to hear of the deaths of two of our Past State Chaplains Msgr. John R. Snyder and Bishop Anthony G. Bosco. Msgr. Snyder served as State Clergy Consultant 1976-1980 under State Regent, Rose Morgan. Bishop Bosco was

no stranger to Pennsylvania Catholic Daughters. He served as State Chaplain from 1988-1992 under State Regent, Marie Davoli, and again, as Bishop Emeritus in 2005-2007 under State Regent, Letty Calvetti. What an honor for Pennsylvania Catholic Daughters, especially the Greensburg Diocesan members, to be asked to be Honor Guard for the viewing of Bishop Bosco. This is the first time an honor guard was done in the diocese, and I hope to see it continue with a death of a CDA member.

his college was founded by Pope Pius IX in 1859 so that there

American seminarians are nominated by their Bishops to go to Rome to study for their priestly ministry. The college also provides a residence in Rome for English-speaking priests pursuing graduate studies at Roman universities. There are approximately 400 seminarians and priests studying there now.



Introducing State Chaplain, Rev. Timothy F. O'Sullivan

Dear Catholic Daughters and Friends,

reetings from Levittown, Pennsylvania! (*Located in Bristol Township in lower Bucks County in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia.*) In late May of this year, at the request of Peggy Guckin, Pennsylvania State Regent of the Catholic Daughters of the Americas, Archbishop Charles Chaput of Philadelphia, appointed me as State Chaplain to the Catholic Daughters of the Americas. I am delighted to join with you as we continue to carry out the work of the Lord throughout our Commonwealth.

By way of introduction, I was ordained a priest by the late Anthony Cardinal Bevilacqua in Philadelphia on May 21, 1994. In my nineteen-plus years of priestly ministry, I have been stationed at Holy Innocents Parish (*in Philadelphia*), Our Lady of Perpetual Help Parish (*in Morton, Delaware County*), Saint Monica Parish (*in Philadelphia*), Saint Dominic Parish (*in Philadelphia*), Saint Ephrem Parish (*in Bensalem, Bucks County*) and Immaculate Conception Parish (*in Levittown, Bucks County*) where I currently serve as Pastor.

I had the opportunity to witness first-hand the good works of the Catholic Daughters of the Americas in three of my assignments: Holy Innocents Parish, Saint Dominic Parish and Saint Ephrem Parish.

Last October, as you may recall, our Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI announced a "YEAR OF FAITH" which continues through this coming November when we will celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King on November 24, 2013. In his Apostolic Letter, "Porta Fidei" (which literally translates as "Door of Faith") Pope Benedict reminded us, "Faith grows when it is lived as an experience of love received and when it is communicated as an experience of grace and joy. It makes us fruitful, because it expands our hearts in hope and enables us to bear life-giving witness: indeed, it opens the hearts and minds of those who listen to respond to the Lord's invitation to adhere to His word and become His disciples."

I cannot help but think that these words which announced the "YEAR OF FAITH" are also very true in regard to the works of the Catholic Daughters of the Americas! Like so many of the wonderful Catholic organizations in our Church, the Catholic Daughters of the America exist to help the Church in her mission to carry out the gospel message. In so many of the activities that our Catholic Daughters of the Americas carry out on parish and Court levels, you truly allow the faith you love to radiate in your actions and activities.

As we welcome these last months of our "YEAR OF FAITH," may we never lose sight of why we do what we do—whether we are a parish, a family, individuals or a CDA Court—and for whom we carry out our evangelization efforts!

Over these next few months, I invite all of us, perhaps as a Court spiritual exercise, or simply as committed Catholics, to:

- +Reflect on the gift of faith you first received in Baptism and which you nurture through participating in the life of the Church.
 - +Deepen your knowledge and understanding of the beauty of the teachings of our Catholic faith.
- +Read, reflect and pray with the Sacred Scriptures. The Scriptures are an intimate account of the way God has blessed His people. By virtue of your Baptism you ARE a member of His people.

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The Rosary Points Us to the Mysteries

he Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary was established by Pope Saint Pius V in 1573 to give thanks for a critical victory won by Christians in the Battle of Lepanto. That God's intervention in a pivotal moment, when the Church was threatened with hostile forces, is attributed to this simple prayer recalls for me the pivotal role that the rosary has played in my own life and in the lives of many devotees I have had the grace to know. In my high school and college years, I can say that the rosary kept me Catholic. My fourth-grade teacher, Sister Callista, prayed a decade every day with my class. This must have made an impression on me, because when I later

This must have made an impression on me, because when I later went to public high school and had a desire to somehow keep God in my life, I took to praying the rosary every day. Sister Callista's impression was a bit faded, because I had forgotten about the mysteries of the rosary. I would just say my Our Fathers and Hail Marys each night without meditating on any mystery.

Mary and the truth

In college I met some Catholic students who met to pray the rosary once a week. It was then that I was reminded of the mysteries, and became a bit concerned as to whether all my high school rosaries "counted." In hindsight, I recognized that Our Lady used those rosaries to draw me closer to her Son through her motherly love. For in my college, the fundamentalist Christian influence on campus was very strong and quite anti-Catholic. When these students would assault my Catholicism with their prefab scriptural arguments, I was often brought up short and might have succumbed to their efforts to get me out of what they called the "whore of Babylon." What stopped me? When I discovered that they didn't pray the rosary. Worse still, they scoffed at Catholics' devotion to Mary. At that point, their lack of love for Mary convinced me that they were not following the fullness of truth, regardless of their arguments. Mary was there for me in a pivotal moment of my religious and human development.

A bond forged

I have noticed that I am not alone among those that Mary has protected and preserved for her Son. When I speak to others who survived the secular forces of growing up, I frequently find that somehow the rosary has been in their background. There are three families I know, one from New York, one from New England and one from California. All three are large and all of the grown children in the families continue to live their faith in a very lively way. Many have had the grace to meet lay movements in the Church which have enabled them to recognize Christ as an active presence in their lives. All of these families prayed a family rosary with regularity, whether nightly or weekly or on long car rides. Many of them did not particularly like praying the rosary as children. One friend recalls dreading it when, during a long ride, one of his parents would recommend the prayer. As partial as their younger devotion was, it still seems to have forged a bond with Our Lady which never allowed them to stray too far from her Son.

Fostering a relationship

What is it about the rosary? Perhaps it is the fact that Christ is seen in relationship to his mother who loves him with such a human love. Through Mary, it is impossible to reduce Jesus to a mere religious icon or to an abstract God. You pray to Jesus in a personal, intimate way because you see him from the human and intimate point of view of his mother. In later years, when Christ himself or his Church is mocked or insulted, somehow the insults don't ring true, they don't take root. Because on some level, you know Jesus as a real person who is somehow familiar. Even if the rosaries were not prayed with perfect knowledge or devotion, they still fostered a relationship and a knowledge of

Christ that stands against whatever fashionable opinions are circulating in the current climate.

I still pray a rosary every day. And I have to admit that sometimes I just don't feel like it, but I am convinced that this mysterious prayer continues to deepen my bonds with our Lord and continues to keep me praying to the person of Jesus who became flesh in Mary's womb, and not to the current abstract interpretation of him that might be circulating in my head which continues to be bombarded by the secular and hostile forces of our culture.

The rosary points us to the Mysteries of the life of Christ, and it is itself an efficacious mystery of Jesus' and Mary's love for us.

very Catholic Daughters of the Americas court should find some way to become involved in a youth activity. One activity could be a Junior CDA. However, if your court is not able to organize a Junior Court to meet monthly, there are many other options in order to fulfill the goals of the youth program.

The goals of the youth program are:

- ♦ To promote personal and spiritual growth
- → To promote opportunities for youth to experience service to others
- → To develop an awareness and appreciation of diversity Any of these goals can be met through a variety of activities. The National CDA encourages courts to participate in the Education Contests. If your court does this, how do you present the awards? You could have a special meeting (a breakfast, an ice cream social, etc.) or you could invite the winners and their parents to your meeting.

Does your court have activities for graduating high school seniors or for your First Communion recipients?

Here is another opportunity to work with the youth of your parish. You could provide a scholarship or an award to encourage academic achievement.

How can you involve the youth of your parish in service to others? Toy drives, food collections and other ways to help the needy can be established in your schools or CCD programs to emphasize the needs of those less fortunate.

Some type of recycling program will develop awareness of our environment and the need to preserve our resources.

Can you develop an awareness of the diversity found in our world? Sharing ethnic traditions and foods—especially around the holidays—can help perpetuate the rich heritage found in our nation. Special needs people, nursing homes and Women's History or Black History all provide opportunities to develop programs dealing with diversity.

Does your court have to address all of the goals of the youth program? Of course not. The *Tools of the Trade* provides suggestions on types of programs that can be organized to respond to the needs of today's youth. Each court and each community is different. Use the *Tools* to guide your court and the creativity of your members to develop programs unique to you.

The State Membership Team has met or will soon be meeting with the District Deputies of each diocese. The District Deputies are to be an integral part of the Membership Team in their respective dioceses and are to work with the Diocesan Membership Team in ensuring that membership drives are held at least annually in each court. Each court is responsible for holding a membership drive at least once a year using the Diocesan Membership Team as support. Local courts are to report to the diocesan membership team the date(s) and times of their planned membership drives. A report detailing the outcome of the membership drives will ensure that each court is actively working on recruiting new, active members.

An example of the types of information to put in the report include how many local churches were included in the membership drive, how many women signed up to inquire further about the CDA, the date of the planned "Tea" for potential members, and the outcome of the "Tea." Also include how many court members participated. Holding the membership drive at the same time each year will help to make certain its success. The court will know to plan for it in its yearly budget as well as potential members will, in time, know that the CDA is having its membership drive. (They may very well get "sick and tired" of hearing the speech and join out of local court persistence!) As membership in our state has declined each year, it is imperative that we strive to put membership recruiting as a top priority.

National has recently published new and updated brochures for members to use in the recruitment efforts. These can be purchased online through the National website. Also, keep in mind that National awards are presented to courts whose membership increases the most. With fall approaching and the new Education Contest themes being known, use the opportunity to recruit new members (and possibly junior or campus court members).

who "went home to God." The first was Monsignor James W. Peterson, who had been Clergy Consultant and Study-Club Moderator to Court Erie #515 from 1952-1965. (During this period of time the Court's Chaplain was Archbishop John Mark Gannon.) At that time, the Court held two meetings a month, one to address the business concerns of the Court, and the other one held as a "social function," where dinners and study-club topics were discussed. Monsignor Peterson seemed always to make time for these meetings, while teaching English at Gannon College (now university). He became involved with prison ministry and served as Chaplain at the Erie County Prison and also Diocesan Vocations Director.

In 1975 he was named pastor of St. Teresa Parish in Union City, and he founded Maria House, a non-profit corporation which continues to provide small group living for men in need of growth in community for healing from drug and alcohol addiction. Today, there are six houses with 30-35 residents. He also helped to establish the Avila House retreat center in Union City. He was extremely involved in these two projects until his death on May 13, 2013.

He authored several books including "The Leisure of the Holy Spirit," "More I Could Not Ask," and "A Sweep of Saint John's Gospel"—members may be interested in reading his spiritual direction and guidance. Many people within the Erie area looked on him as having "saintly qualities."

The second priest who passed away was **Monsignor John R. Snyder** on June 22, 2013. Archbishop John Mark Gannon assigned him to study philosophy and theology, and he received his degree in philosophy from St. Bonaventure University and later pursued graduate work at John Carroll University in Cleveland. Initially, he was assigned as assistant pastor and taught in parish high schools. When St. Mark Seminary opened in 1959, he became a member of the first faculty and still served as an assistant pastor.

In 1975 he was appointed as pastor of St. Patrick Parish in Franklin, Pennsylvania, where he remained for twenty-one years. It was during this time that he became acquainted with Rose Morgan and the Catholic Daughters of the Americas. Rose Morgan served in the various local offices of Court St. Thomas #1483, and proceeded up the line in State offices to become State Regent from 1976-1980. It was during this time that Msgr. Snyder became the State Clergy Consultant to the Pennsylvania State Board. At that time Bishop Alfred Watson from Erie was the State Chaplain.

When Msgr. Snyder was contacted by this author for information and his picture to enter into the State's history book, he was delighted to comply with the request. In his final years, he stayed at the Mercy Terrace apartments, and acted as the Sisters of Mercy Chaplain from 2000-2010. In 2010, he resided at the Sisters of Mercy Health Care Center. Whenever you met him at the brunch following Mass on Sundays at the Mercy Chapel, or you stopped and talked with him when the Sisters held their annual June retreats at the Motherhouse, he was always approachable and happy to talk with you. He will be missed by many.
