

Put on the Face of God

Dear Catholic Daughters of the Americas and Friends,

We are in the process of preparing for the celebration of Christ's birth. In all likelihood, Christmas this year will be a little bit different for many of us due to the Coronavirus pandemic that has plagued our world for almost a year now. There is so much fear and negativity around us. We need something truly good and positive like Christmas to raise our spirits. We certainly need to celebrate and enjoy every aspect of this beautiful and important Holy Day, especially if we want to look into the future with hopefulness and joy.

Sometimes we hear adults say that Christmas is for children. I think we can easily disagree with that. Especially now during these difficult times, we adults have even more reason to celebrate and rejoice at Christmas time than the children. We are able to understand the themes, symbols and traditions of the season and to celebrate the deeper realities of life that the birth of Jesus is meant to celebrate—namely, the principles, values and teachings of the Gospel taking hold more deeply and more firmly in people's minds and hearts.


These days we are still encouraged to wear a mask or some form of face covering not because we enjoy it but because we do it out of love, respect and safety for others. Mask wearing certainly changes our lives. I can tell you that I have not recognized some people over these last few months and I am sure some people have not recognized me when in public. It was because of the masks we have been wearing. This leads me to the following short reflection and a story that can give a positive spin on the mask wearing of our current days.

The word **hypocrite** finds its origin in Greek language. In it the word *hypokrites* describes "an actor" or "a stage player." It literally translates as "an interpreter from underneath," which reflects that ancient Greek actors wore masks and the actor spoke from underneath that mask. Obviously, the mask helped the actors get into the characters and communicate the story as accurately as possible.

"The Happy Hypocrite" is the name of a story, I read not that long ago, written by the late Max Beerbohm. Sir Henry Maximilian "Max" Beerbohm was an English essayist, parodist and caricaturist under the signature Max. He first became known in the 1890s as a dandy and a humorist, but eventually became one of the most respected writers of the 20th century. "The Happy Hypocrite" is the story of a man named, "Lord George Hell," a man with no scruples—a terrible villain who not only is mean but also looks mean. Just looking at his face is enough to put one in mortal fear. Lord George Hell falls in love with a beautiful and innocent maiden named, "Little Miss Jane Mere." She refuses his offer of marriage, saying, "I can never be the wife of a man whose face is not saintly." As a result, Lord George Hell engages the services of the finest mask-maker in the land, Mr. Aeneas, and asks him to fashion for him a mask of a saint. When his work is done, the mask is perfect in every detail. Again, Lord George Hell seeks the hand of the beautiful and innocent Little Miss Jane Mere. But this time, he is wearing the saint's mask, and she accepts his marriage proposal. Minute-by-minute, hour-by-hour, and day-by-day, Lord George Hell does everything he can to keep up the hypocrisy. In short, he tries to act like a saint. He is careful, always, to portray himself as a kindly, unselfish, patient and attentive husband. He is especially careful not to reveal any of his evil tendencies. He is successful in maintaining this saintly image until the day when he encounters an old enemy, La Gambogi, who sees through the facade. She tears off the mask in front of Lord George Hell's lovely wife. The mask lays before her on the lawn, upturned to the sky. But when she looks at his face, line for line, feature for feature, a saint's face is revealed. Lord George Hell had actually become the person he was trying to be, minute-by-minute, hour-by-hour and day-by-day. Practicing being a good person had made him one.

Of course, I am not suggesting that we wear masks of saints. But we are called to wear Christ. We are called to practice our faith and become the Christ-like person God intends us to be: *that is the spirit and meaning of Christmas*. Minute-by-minute, hour-by-hour and day-by-day, practice becoming the beautiful, peaceful, loving, caring and forgiving person God made us to be. Minute-by-minute, hour-by-hour and day-by-day, practice living in defiance of everything in this world that disfigures the picture of God's loving face revealed in His only begotten Son, from the Manger to the Cross.

We know that December 25th is not the actual birthday of Christ. It is set aside as the day to celebrate the birth of Christ around the world. Originally, December 25th—*Dies Natalis Solis Invicti* (the "Birth of the Invincible Sun")—was a celebration dedicated to Mitra, identified with the Roman god, Sol, meaning the Sun. Christians chose to give December 25th a new meaning and set it as the day to celebrate the birthday of the true and only Son of God as a triumph over paganism. December 25th was also selected due to its proximity to the winter solstice because of its symbolic theological meaning. After the solstice, the days begin to lengthen with longer hours of sunlight, which we Christians see as representing the Light of Jesus Christ entering the world.

7. Unfinished Business
8. New Business
9. Announcements
10. Program; Closing Prayer and Singing of Ode
(Three loud raps of gavel to stand) If there is no further business to come before the court, meeting is adjourned (one loud rap of gavel) ♦

National Center on Sexual Exploitation

The National Center on Sexual Exploitation (NCOSE) is the leading organization exposing the links between all forms of sexual abuse and exploitation. With sixty years of experience, its mission is to defend human dignity and oppose sexual exploitation. It is a non-profit organization which investigates a wide-range of sexual abuse areas including child sexual abuse, child-on-child harmful sexual behavior, image-based sexual abuse, institutional sexual abuse, men's violence against women and many other forms of abuse and its repercussions.

NCOSE develops projects that strike at the roots of systems which support and sustain sexual abuse and exploitation. It believes that identifying and understanding how sexual abuse and exploitation overlap and connect supports their strategy in eliminating all sexual abuse. NCOSE seeks to educate the general public, corporate leaders and policymakers, in order to create and support a world free from sexual abuse and exploitation.

One of their activities involves corporate advocacy. There's a lot of money to be made from the sex industry. NCOSE produces a yearly list called, "Dirty Dozen List" listing the organizations which continue to spread sexual exploitation by shining a light on their poor business policies and practices. Its Law Center helps to defeat radical and damaging legislation, helps establish legal precedents and construct lawsuits to fight sexual exploitation.

White Ribbon Against Pornography (WRAP) is now 30-years-old. This group was established to give a voice to those opposing pornography. It created a White Ribbon Against Pornography (WRAP) Week which encourages a national awareness and activism week. This year, the White Ribbon Against Pornography week ran from October 30–November 6. It provided an important platform for citizens to raise awareness about the public health crisis of pornography.

In the past, many Catholic Daughter groups got involved, on the last Sunday of October, distributing a white ribbon to their parishioners. They would proudly wear a white ribbon to show their stance against pornography. WRAP would put up anti-pornography billboards, organize anti-pornography motorcades and parades and rally dignitaries, such as mayors and governors, to join together to fight against pornography.

The Gratitude Rosary

With so much negative news these days, please consider meditating on joy and gratitude while reciting the rosary. Lift up your mind to God in joy and gratitude. The way it's done is simple. Take each bead of the rosary and thank God for something. Learn to appreciate things you may not have noticed before. An alternate option is to also say the Hail Mary on each bead after your thank you to God.



A guideline designed for the Catholic Daughters is as follows:

Begin the Rosary in the usual way—the Apostle's Creed, the Our Father, Three Hail Marys and the Glory Be. After the Our Father for each Mystery, think of ten (10) things for which you are grateful.

THE JOYFUL MYSTERIES

THE ANNUNCIATION: *Mary rejoices to do God's will.*

As Mary said "yes" to God, think of 10 ways we say "yes" as members of the Catholic Daughters of the Americas. Some examples could be the yes to membership, yes to an office, or yes to help with projects.

THE VISITATION: *John the Baptist leapt for joy in his mother's womb.*

How do we leap for joy as members of the Catholic Daughters? Or what opportunities for visiting others is given to us through CDA?

THE NATIVITY: *God himself was born as a child.*

How do Catholic Daughters help children or expectant mothers?
